Who we are

Since 2008 the German Internet Governance Forum (IGF-D) addresses issues of network policy and internet regulation. In April 2024, 34 people from the German internet governance community came together to found a supporting association – the Internet Governance Forum Deutschland e. V. – in addition to our steering committee and Secretariat. The supporting organisation is registered with the German registry court since the beginning of December 2024. The steering committee consists of four members of each stakeholder group (Government, Parliamentarians, Technical Community, Business, Civil Society, Academia and Youth) that consult the IGF-D in its aim to bring more attention to issues of internet regulation in Germany politics and the public sphere. It is supported by the secretariat, led by DENIC eG since the beginning of 2023.

Annual Meeting Preparation

In April the Steering Committee decided on forming a Programme Committee for the IGF-D 2025 which had its first meeting at the end of April. The call for proposals opened in May and the Programme Committee reviewed and consolidated the submitted proposals over the month of July. Members of the Programme Committee stayed in close exchange with the session organisers to track progress and potential problems.

While the agenda-setting was fostered by the Programme Committee, the Secretariat oversaw finding a suitable location, organising the technical support, the communication strategy as well as supporting the Programme Committee.



Annual Meeting Overview

The IGF-D 2025 was held in the Representation of the Free State of Saxony to the Federation with the option of remote participation. Over 150 persons registered for the IGF-D 2025 with a no-show-rate of about 30 %.

Cables, chips and satellites: What infrastructure do we need?

From fibre optic cables to satellite networks: digital infrastructure is increasingly becoming the scene of geopolitical power struggles. At the same time, new areas of social tension are emerging – from the energy consumption of data centres to surveillance from space. Germany and the EU want to strengthen their digital capacity to act. But what infrastructure do we really need? Which goals should be prioritised? And who should ultimately retain control? Multi-stakeholder perspectives on the facets of physical digital infrastructure and the strategy of digital sovereignty.

Surveillance vs. the rule of law? Police work in a networked world

Secure communication is a fundamental right. However, a high-level group of experts is proposing to lift encryption for law enforcement at European level. The corresponding strategy (Protect EU) is now available, and the technical implementation is to be finalised next year. Together with automated data processing, including biometric data – which is also controversial – security authorities could significantly increase their information capabilities. Civil society groups, lawyers and cybersecurity researchers counter that these plans not only destroy business models, such as those of VPN providers, and create more uncertainty, but also violate fundamental rights and have no place in a



democracy. What is new about the current debate on surveillance and privacy? How does the issue affect internet governance and what position should Germany take?

Self-protection out of action – domain security in Germany in 2025: an analysis, an appeal, a way out

Domains are the digital gateways to public authorities, companies and organisations, yet an alarming number of them are unprotected. A recent analysis of over 20,000 domains in Germany reveals serious security gaps: only 2% meet basic standards, while 98% remain vulnerable. This lightning talk will show why domain security is often neglected despite NIS2, GDPR and IT baseline protection, and what risks this poses for society and digital sovereignty.

It also serves as a teaser for a small series of webinars by IGF-D to follow in the autumn, which will deal with further questions and problems relating to DNS and Transport Layer Security (TLS), among other things.

Towards sustainable computer criminal law – security, innovation and legal certainty

Ethical hacking strengthens cyber security and is a key component of digital security in our society, but legal grey areas often hinder responsible IT security research. This session discusses how modern computer criminal law can create a clear framework and enable innovation by 2030. International best practices and concrete reform proposals such as pre-registration, reporting centres and binding standards for companies will be presented. The aim is to create an innovation-friendly environment that legally safeguards and actively promotes security research. This will strengthen digital resilience in the long term and build trust in IT security in Europe.
